




# STATE OF CHRONIC DISEASE IN ALABAMA


# LEADING CHRONIC DISEASES IN ALABAMA





## **ACCESS**

It takes Alabamans an average of **14.2 minutes** by car to travel to the nearest hospital, compared to **13.3 minutes nationally**."



A wave of rural hospital closures in recent years has raised concerns about access to health care. 64 rural hospitals in the United States closed between 2013 and 2017, more than twice the number of closures in the previous five-year period.<sup>11</sup>

### PREVENTION AND AFFORDABILITY



7.9% of adults in Alabama (292,000) reported an unmet need for mental health treatment, compared to 6.2% nationally<sup>14</sup>



10% of Alabama's population is uninsured, compared to 9.2% nationally<sup>15</sup>




8.6% of Alabamans reported needing to see a doctor but couldn't because of cost, compared to 9.7% nationally<sup>16</sup>




Nationally, more than 1 in 3 Medicare beneficiaries spent at least 20% of their income on out-of-pocket costs. Out-of-pocket spending increased for those in fair or poor health, those with low incomes, and those aged 85+. **These costs are expected to rise across the board by 2030**. 17
